Rogation Sunday: May 17, 2009

The Church of the Epiphany celebrated a special Rogation Sunday on May 17, 2009. This is the traditional day of the liturgical year when we ask God's blessing on our crops, as well as the agriculture and fishing industries; *The Washington Post* ran a story on May 18 about the Blessing of the Fleet on the Potomac to mark the beginning of the boating season. At Epiphany's 11:00 liturgy, the Rev. Jennifer McKenzie and members of the Environmental Stewardship Ministry Team led the congregation in the blessing of soil, water, seeds, and gardens yes, we had a bowl full of dirt in church!

After the service, several people made the trek up to Epiphany's rooftop garden to plant vegetables and flowers to be enjoyed in the church arrangements and at coffee hour in the coming months. In the vegetable department, we planted grape tomatoes, radishes, carrots, beets, zucchinis, corn, and some herbs. As far as flowers, we chose nasturtiums, coreopsis, gaillardia, dianthus, Echinacea, lupines, osteospermum, Shasta and gerbera daisies, and delphinium. If even half of them make it, we should have a gorgeous and delicious summer.

Did you miss out on the fun? The Environmental Stewardship Ministry Team would love to have you on board. You don't have to make a big commitment – just let us know you're interested and we'll tell you one of the many ways you can help. We can certainly use people to weed and water during the week and on Sundays. Ministry Team members are James Rogers, Susan Walker, Rachel Barham, Charles Burg, Patrick Marchman, and Joanne Charles.

O God, who has given each one of us the opportunity to share in the cultivation of the land, give us also such skill and patience in digging and sowing and planting that vegetables and flowers may sustain our bodies and gladden our hearts by their usefulness and beauty. If you have been following the threads on Epiphany's Facebook page, you may be wondering about all the discussion around creating an alternative Episcopal liturgy at Epiphany. (If you haven't been, it's time to join our Facebook group!) After several informal conversations about this possibility last year, it reemerged at a vestry brainstorming retreat in January, and Randolph has recently started probing the idea with the congregation. While this wouldn't be launched hastily without consideration of the resources involved, it does seem to be something around which there is a lot of energy.

The aim of an alternative Sunday night liturgy would be to create a space for people wanting a new worship experience, especially for those who might not be drawn to our current Sunday services. We have been reminded over the past few years of the need for more parishioners if we are to continue the many ministries that Epiphany currently offers; this might be one way of bringing new members to our community.

The idea is still very much in the discussion stage, but a number of questions will need to be answered. How do we create a service that doesn't just draw people away from our morning services, or from other congregations? What kind of resources would we need to start a service of this type? How might other congregations in the area participate? What kind of liturgy would we use? (Ideas I have heard discussed range from a Celtic service, to a U2charist, to Taize.)

To continue examining whether this is something to pursue, Randolph is reenergizing the Worship Ministry Team. If it is something you would like to be involved with, please let him know. This group will be

A Paean to Haydn

Franz Joseph Haydn died two hundred years ago this 31 May, another composer's milestone date to acknowledge this year (Earlier, we observed Mendelssohn's 200th birthday and the 300th anniversary of Handel's death.) In reading about him in *Grove Music Online*, I learned (and should have known long ago) that I share a birthday with Haydn, too (31 March). And all these years, I dismissed him as, well...



I have a friend (Sam) from music school who told me, way back when, that he had no use for any music written between the death of Bach (1750) and the rise of Stravinsky (ca. 1900). If you are a public radio listener, you would notice that, if Sam were programming for almost any classical music station, there would be a lot of silence, or repetition. Combining Sam's prejudice with those of the current public radio programmers would leave us only works written between 1600 and 1750, since public radio has virtually no use for anything written before Michael Praetorius's *Terpsichore*, (in part because public radio never plays ANY vocal music, unless it's Live from the Met or Christmas carols, and much of what was written down in the Middle Ages and early Renaissance was vocal music), and also has no use for anything written in the 20th century. (One time two years ago, I called into Baltimore's classical radio station during an all-request show to ask for John Adams's *Lollapalooza*. Boy, did THAT stand out like a sore thumb – but I loved hearing it, and I hope that at least one person who didn't know, yet may still have hated John Adams's music, was converted.)

For two days, I have tried to distill the lllleennnggttthhhyyy article about Joseph Hadyn in *The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians*, and just can't pull it off. Haydn lived for seventy-seven years. He wrote over one hundred symphonies, roughly fourteen choral masses, a couple of oratorios and a handful of operas, LOTS of chamber music, arrangements of British folk songs, *blah-blah-blah*. He was a church choir boy until his voice changed;

struggled to make a living as a young adult; spent years in the employ of Prince Esterhazy in Austria; worked in Vienna, Paris, and London; outlived the much-younger Mozart by nearly twenty years; and practically invented the symphony, and even more so, the string quartet. His contributions to sacred music and organ music, the two genres most relevant to church music, are a small part of his output, but at the same time, Joseph Haydn remains one of the most influential people in the history of Western music.

The Grove article uses terms such as “earnestness and depth of feeling”, “wit”, “humour” and “rhetoric” to describe his music. Those qualities make me want to rethink my disaffection with Haydn. Maybe he isn't as boring as I – or Sam – thought. Rest in peace, Herr Haydn. I'm going to the library to give your music another go; maybe you'll hear some familiar strains from the piano soon.

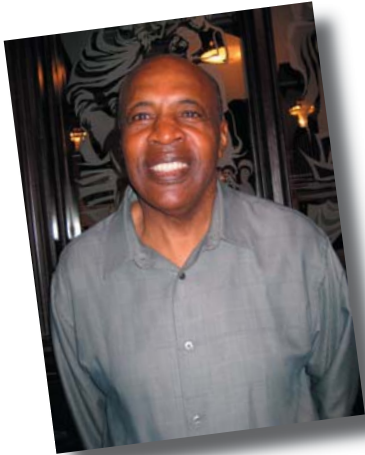

Capital Campaign at the Half Way Mark

The Campaign for Epiphany is the current fund raising effort to renovate our historic and sacred buildings. The campaign began when parishioners made pledges for the renovation in the fall of 2007. Pledges are being paid over the three year period from January 2008 through December 2010. As this summer marks the half way point of that effort, I would like to report to you on our progress.

According to our parish pledge recorder, we currently have 119 renovation pledges for a total of \$805,865. That comes out to an average of \$6772 per pledge. According to our parish accountant, we have received \$418,557 to date. These funds, of course, are in a designated account for the renovation, earning interest. We are on target at this half way mark, having received a little over half the amount pledged. Good job, but please don't let this sign of progress make us overconfident. It is very important that we all keep our pledges current.

Within the coming weeks, the Capital Campaign Ministry Team will be sending each renovation pledger a record of the amount they originally pledged and the amount we have received to date. We strongly urge you to review your records and make sure this information is correct. We also urge you to make plans to pay your total pledge within the next year and a half. Of course, the sooner you can get the money in, the more interest it can be earning while we wait to begin the renovation.

In addition to the renovation pledges from parishioners, there are other sources of funding. Marcelle Clarke, a beloved Epiphany parishioner, died several years ago and left money to Epiphany specifically for the construction of a columbarium. Currently this account totals \$145,123. The columbarium is a part of our renovation plans. Several years ago, Epiphany sold the TDR's (Transferable Development Rights) above the church. That account currently totals \$150,591 and is earmarked for the renovation.

These two funds added to your renovation pledges bring our total to \$1,101,579.

The current aspect of the campaign is seeking funds from outside the parish. The Capital Campaign Ministry Team is doing mailings and phone calls to solicit funds from Epiphany neighbors and friends. These could be people connected to us through history, music, outreach, weekday associates, and former associations. Our in-house fund raising developer will be working on some grants

that might bring in money for historic preservation and accessibility.

Sometimes, I feel like we are "*the little engine that could*" as we attempt to climb this huge mountain of money needed for our renovation plans. Other times, I feel we are a people of great faith who are attempting great things for God. Please hold the Campaign for Epiphany in your prayers and someday, with God's help, we **will** renovate our beloved Epiphany making her ready to do ministry for the next century and a half.

COMIS and MARPAT Foundations: Significant Supporters of The Welcome Table This Spring

As May comes to an end, two major grants which have given great support to The Welcome Table since December 2008 also are ending. The COMIS Foundation awarded Epiphany \$30,000—our largest grant in 2008 or so far in 2009—and the MARPAT Foundation awarded us \$15,000 concurrently. Those grants represent almost 80% of the total costs of operating The Welcome Table for that six-month period (compensation to the church for staff time working on The Welcome Table, prorated utility costs, an evaluator's fee, and a portion of food and supplies). A significant portion of food and supplies, over the year, is provided by parishioners' and friends' generous contributions, which Epiphany would not be able to do without. However, the overall Welcome Table budget, which exceeds \$100,000, could not be met without external grants. Because of that financial reality and because The Welcome Table is the only breakfast/friendship/professional counseling program in downtown Washington on a weekend, some 5,000 homeless attendees were very significantly impacted by COMIS and MARPAT.

Last fall COMIS invited all Washington Diocesan parishes to apply for grants that would improve "accessibility." Mary Dail saw the invitation in *Church House News* and alerted me to it. Our first thought was that "accessibility" must refer to building construction—ramps. However, facing extremely high costs to keep The Welcome Table effective, we wrote COMIS, asking whether homeless persons' "accessibility" to a welcoming atmosphere, nutritious breakfast, and professional counseling every Sunday would meet COMIS's definition of improving accessibility; we were delighted when they answered affirmatively. Thanks to COMIS for the very significant funding and all it has made possible to so many of Washington's neediest.

Thanks to MARPAT as well: we wrote a preliminary proposal, on the basis of which we were invited in to the Stage II competition. MARPAT provided all Stage II invitees with the best technical



assistance workshop I've ever attended. Much as a result of the information and advice we received there, our proposal for \$15,000—to support part of the costs of maintaining an industrial kitchen, costs of vital counseling and other staff time, and an evaluator—was funded.

MARPAT has invited Epiphany to submit a second Welcome Table proposal and also to discuss with them our needs for capacity building, for which there may be a possibility of future MARPAT funding.

I'm on the *Church House Newslist* now, watching to see whether COMIS issues another application invitation to Washington parishes. If so, we'll again seek funds for The Welcome Table to enable it to continue to build the self-esteem of so many exceptionally needy people, as this year's grant has helped make possible.

Whether or not COMIS issues another invitation, and whether or not we're awarded a second MARPAT grant, I wanted you to know what wonderful friends COMIS and MARPAT have been this year to Epiphany and its Welcome Table guests.

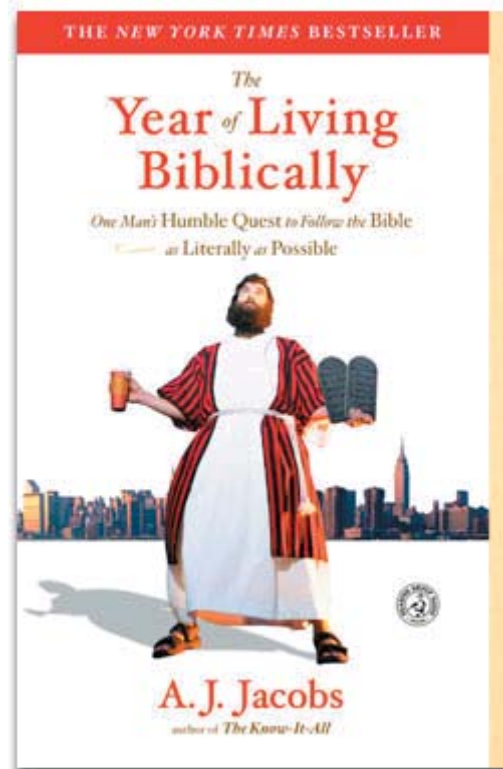
