Wardens' Corner

There's nothing quite as satisfying as seeing dreams become reality. After discussing the idea of starting an alternative Sunday evening worship service at Epiphany for many months, we're excited about the possibility of beginning one in the near future.



What is an emergent worship community? You may have heard this potential Sunday evening service described in the context of the "emerging church" movement and might wonder what that means. Defining this term is more than I can do in my allotted 500 words, but I've noticed several themes running through the blogs and websites on the topic. This is a movement that started in churches in the late 1980's and 1990's to explore ways to make the communal Christian journey more relevant to a post-modern world. Emerging congregations tend to experiment with different liturgical styles, often combining ancient practices with contemporary ones. Celtic services, Taize, and the blues are among the styles of worship that these churches have explored. Images I've seen of these services include everything from candlelight and guitars to drums and Power Point. In addition to involving different worship styles, emerging congregations also emphasize forming a welcoming community. Rather than identifying people as "in" or "out" based on their adherence to certain creeds or a baptismal experience, all are welcomed into the journey. Participants in these communities who might not all come from "churched" backgrounds are sometimes described as moving from being spiritual wanderers to pilgrims. Another characteristic of these communities is that instead of focusing just on doctrine and theology, there is a commitment to helping build Christ's kingdom on earth by pursuing issues of social justice. These principles all overlap with the values I already see at Epiphany.

So, what's next? As we move towards starting an alternative Sunday evening service of this sort at Epiphany, I hope you'll join us for some events the weekend of September 26 and 27. Together with the Diocese of Washington's Committee on Urban Ministry, Epiphany is sponsoring a weekend of workshops and a

worship service on how principles of the emerging church movement can be incorporated into any church. (Details are provided elsewhere in the Parish Guide.) We're thrilled to have the diocese involved in this journey with us!

Why are we considering this, again? I'm excited to be moving in this direction for several reasons. First, this is a promising way to bring new parishioners into Epiphany who might be drawn to a different form of worship than those we currently offer. This could help meet our often voiced need for more people to be involved in order to continue Epiphany's current level of ministry. In addition, I have to admit the option of Sunday evening worship is especially appealing because I love the idea of spending the morning at brunch with friends or being out of town for the weekend and still making it back in time for church. Also, other Episcopalians in the diocese share our excitement and want to participate. There is great potential for creating connections with other congregations in the area.

All this to say, I hope to see you on September 26 and 27 as we continue to explore some new directions in which the Epiphany family might be moving!

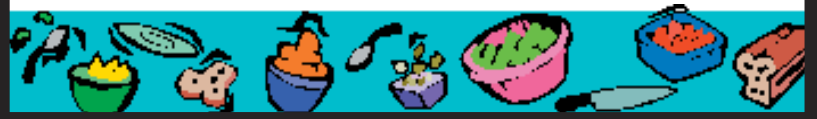

Music News for Autumn

The days are getting shorter (though the humidity isn't falling, nor the temperatures...) pointing us in the direction of a new program year in the church. The Epiphany choir returns to regular service with rehearsal on Thursday, 10 September, and is always happy to welcome new members, especially at the beginning of the season. Whatever your previous musical experience or your musical abilities, we invite you to consider joining the choir. Rehearsals, normally held 7:15 – 9:15 PM in the church on Thursdays, begin 10 September. We enjoy making music together, supporting the Epiphany community in worship, praising God through music, and sharing our lives with each other. The choir rehearses Sunday mornings at 10 AM for the 11 AM liturgy, and sings at several other events throughout the year. You are welcome to attend rehearsals with no obligation to join, to see if singing with us would be a good fit for you. I and any of our current choir members would be happy to talk with you about the rewards and responsibilities that are part of singing in the choir. A very simple, non-threatening voice trial – to place you in the right section and scope out your strengths – is part of the process, but should *not* be dreaded like a modern-day battle with the Minotaur.

The Welcome Table (WT) Choir continues to sing at the 8 AM Sunday service. If you would like to sing with the WT Choir, either regularly or occasionally, please meet us in the Parish Hall at 7:30 a.m. on Sundays. Planning for upcoming Sundays happens in the Willard Room just after WT Breakfast on Sundays. For more information, please speak with Carolyn Bledsoe, Bob Wallin or with me. New members are always welcome in this ensemble, too.

After another summer, in which at the 11 AM liturgy we dipped our toes frequently in the refreshing waters of new hymnody, we plan to continue learning new hymns on a monthly basis.

The rector may write or say more about this elsewhere. We plan to introduce one new hymn about every month and reuse it soon after its first appearance, as we did throughout much of June and July. In September we will resume the regular singing of psalms by choir or congregation or both.

Interest among performers in the Tuesday Concert Series (TCS) for the upcoming year and more has been very strong, and as a result, we continue to present a very attractive line-up of concerts from 12:10 until 1:00 PM every Tuesday afternoon throughout the year (with very few exceptions). I hope that you will help us promote the series by telling your friends, family, neighbors and colleagues about it. TCS brochures are plentiful. If you are able to distribute or post them in your neighborhood or workplace, please take copies with you.

There are no other concerts scheduled at Epiphany during the month of September, but as the fall concert season ramps up, I am sure that we will have events to publicize. Look for news of these programs in Sunday announcements, weekly e-mails and future issues of *The Parish Guide*.

Environmental Stewardship Ministry Team Report - GWIPL Energy Audit

Greater Washington Interfaith Power and Light (GWIPL) is “a non-profit initiative that helps congregations, religious institutions and others in the Washington, DC area work for a more just, sustainable and healthier creation by reducing the threat of global warming” (<http://gwipl.org/>).

On Sunday, August 8, GWIPL Program Director, Allison Fisher, led an energy audit of Epiphany’s church and parish house. Present were Rev. Randolph Charles, Mary Dail, Susan Walker, James Rogers, Rachel Barham, Nneka Ukegbu, and Duncan Stevens. Allison began by asking about Epiphany. The answers showed a healthy, active church of which we can all be proud. The following are some of the questions we answered. Perhaps the responses will give you an idea of how important it is to green our building as part of our stewardship mission.

Q: What is our church known for?

A: The Tuesday Concert series, Street Church, being a leader in homeless ministries, Sunday Welcome Table breakfast, having the church open during the day, services for downtown workers, Youth Service Opportunities Project (YSOP), *Street Sense* newspaper that addresses homeless issues, being a place for Muslim worshipers and 12-step groups.

Q: Can you take us through a week at the church?

A: The church and parish house are open every day except Saturdays, though sometimes Ford’s Theatre rehearses on weekends. On Sunday, the buildings are generally open from 6am to 2pm or later, and YSOP groups arrive on Sunday evenings. During the week, the parish house opens around 7am with use by 12-step groups, pastoral counselors, *Street Sense*, YSOP, Muslim worshipers, and others. It remains open until 9pm or later at least three evenings a week. The church is open 10-3.

Q: What are we already doing to address environmental issues?

A: Roof garden, recycling, environmental tips

in the *Parish Guide*, compostable flatware and bio-degradable cups (for when we have to use disposables), and raising awareness. People who are at the church during the week try to monitor energy usage by turning off lights and unused appliances, and even the coffee maker when it isn’t in use. We use donated (i.e., recycled) flowers for the weekday and Sunday services.

Q: What are our goals?

A: The Vestry is not ashamed to say that an increase in our energy efficiency will decrease expenses to our budget, and increase our care for God’s creation. We have short-term and long-term goals: emphasizing our environmental mission as a part of our renovation; becoming known as a “green church”; raising consciousness of small steps that we can take as a congregation and as individuals: everything from replacing inefficient light bulbs to taking advantage of our proximity to public transportation.

After this hour-long conversation, we began our tour of every room of the buildings, making notes of how many exit signs, replaceable light bulbs (not all the bulbs can be replaced with efficient bulbs until technology improves), and energy-pulling appliances were in each room. Opportunities for free or very cheap fixes abounded: the copier might need to stay plugged in to save its settings, but not the paper shredder. The weather sealing was gone from several doors, literally throwing energy costs to the winds. Closing certain doors can maintain climate control so that only rooms that need it are heated or cooled more efficiently.

Allison Fisher is drafting a report about our church with recommendations for our congregation. Stay tuned!

The Kennedy Center kicks off the 2009–2010 season with a celebration highlighting spectacle for the stage and street, including the work of L' Arsenal à Musique from Montreal, one of the leaders in the circus movement, as well as American and French street performers. The arts festival will include artists from the Washington, D.C. region, France, and Canada, as well as representation of the Kennedy Center's programming for the upcoming 2009-2010 season such as the National Symphony Orchestra and more. The Open House Arts Festival is a fun-filled day for the whole family.

Australia's Polyglot Puppet Theatre: *We Built This City*. An interactive celebration of the power of imagination. Striking Viking Story Pirates. Entertaining stories written by kids adapted into sketches and songs. Edwin Fontáñez's Washington Chalk Festival. Take a piece of chalk and create your own masterpiece. I SO Musical Instrument Petting Zoo. Hands-on musical fun for all ages.

Byron Cage. One of Gospel music's most dynamic and popular artists. Chopteeth. A 14-piece Afro-funk orchestra in a dance party for all ages.

Invitation to an Intentional Life of Prayer

Would you like to deepen the quality of your prayer life? Would you like to develop a set of spiritual practices that help you to manage the demands of your life more effectively? Have you wondered what it would be like to serve God and those in need with greater passion and joy? If your answer to any or all of these questions is “yes,” then the Franciscan Spirituality Group may be just the group for you!

What is the FSG?

The Franciscan Spirituality Group (FSG) is a spiritual formation group which meets monthly at The Church of the Epiphany. The FSG was formed a year ago, based on a commitment to help its members live out the meaning of the gospel of Jesus Christ by following the example of the beloved Christian saint, Francis of Assisi. We took a hiatus in July and August, but are pleased to announce that we will resume our monthly meetings starting in September!

Why St. Francis?

The Church of the Epiphany has been a strong supporter of the homeless in the downtown Washington area. With its Street Church ministry on Tuesday afternoons and its Welcome Table services every Sunday at 8:00 am, members of Epiphany have been actively engaged in ministry with the poor and the homeless for quite some time, *as an expression of God's call on The Church of Epiphany*. This thoroughgoing commitment of time, energy, human and monetary resources is in keeping with the spirit of St. Francis, who took Jesus' command to the rich young ruler *literally* to give up all he had and

serve the poor. In many ways, Epiphany can be characterized as a “Franciscan” church!

What Happens in the Monthly Meetings?

Each meeting starts with a brief time of gathering, where we greet one another and catch up on how we're doing. The time of gathering is followed by a time of reflection and meditation upon a theme of Franciscan spirituality from the Bible. This meditation period is followed by discussion of an assigned reading from books on Franciscan spirituality and sharing of the joys and challenges of living according to our personal spiritual practices. A new feature of our monthly meetings will be some instruction in key aspects of Franciscan spirituality. These activities, practiced in a spirit of prayer and reflection, have been designed to provide support to participants as they practice integrating their spiritual ideals with a life of service to God and neighbor.

Who is eligible to join?

All Epiphany parishioners, weekday associates, participants in the Welcome Table ministry, and *anyone* looking for a way to grow in his or her relationship with God are eligible to join the FSG. Come and see!

When does FSG meet?

The Franciscan Spirituality Group normally meets on the first Monday of the month, from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm, in the Willard Room, at The Church of the Epiphany. However, our meeting for September will be held on Tuesday, September 8, because of the Labor Day holiday. Beginning in October, all subsequent meetings will be held on the first Monday evening of each month.
